In the first quarter of 2021, our phone lines were busy with people wondering when, where, and how to get vaccinated. Scoring an appointment was no easy task for seniors without internet and even those with internet. Thanks to teamwork between Sonoma Valley Hospital and the Community Health Center, Vintage House was able to help seniors work around the digital divide and get vaccinated.

We are now in the second quarter (hard to believe), many seniors have been vaccinated, and the question we get the most is: When will Vintage House open? And the answer is, we are sort of open.

Since shelter-in-place ended, we have been – as we like to call it - open with restrictions. Meals are still being distributed curbside and delivered every Wednesday and Friday, virtual classes continue, and we are slowly adding in-person classes. Classes look a little different and here is what you can expect.

People attending in-person classes must register ahead of time, and everyone must enter into their class from the bike path and then have their temperature taken. Vaccinated or not, masks are required at all times. We are closely watching the CDC guidelines as well as our state and county sites and will adjust our protocols based on their guidelines. They change so guickly but we continue to adjust accordingly. Sometimes, it is just plain confusing.

You might ask, "How is it is possible that I can walk into a restaurant, take off my mask, and then dine - but at Vintage House it is so different?" We are in very confusing times, right? But a senior center follows slightly different rules than a restaurant, and we answer to different governing bodies.

People are understandably anxious for things to return to normal.

However, for a while longer, we have a new and sometimes confusing normal. Focusing on the future clears up the confusion a bit. So, we have been preparing for the day when we can once again open our doors to the public.

I know many of you spent time cleaning out the nooks and crannies of your homes. We did our own version of this: our closets are organized, we have new flooring, clean carpet, and a fresh coat of paint on the walls. We also installed acoustic panels in classrooms that were on the "live" side (it should be a lot easier to hear each other). Now, we are adding extra technology to some of the classrooms that will allow us to continue virtual classes and have people in the classroom as well (hybrid classes). Overall, things look clean, bright, and a dash more modern.

When California fully opens, Vintage House will once again unlock its front door and let people enter through our lobby. What is that date? Some say June 15, but that depends on many things that are not in our control. We will take it one day at a time. The safety of staff, volunteers, teachers, and students guides each step we take back to "normal." We will remain patient and hopeful. There is indeed light at the end of the tunnel!

manage to connect by phone or computer or just sitting outside with masks on.

I've also learned there are things I shouldn't take for granted. Remember the empty shelves in the grocery stores and the run on toilet paper at the beginning of all this? I learned that some things, like healthcare, are not well coordinated and the gaps in these systems put us all at risk. I learned that different groups experienced this pandemic in different ways, and one size does not fit all. I learned that the virus doesn't discriminate, and I shouldn't either.

Another lesson I learned was that I could count on Vintage House to step up to the plate and find ways to see that people in my community knew somebody was there for them. I saw Vintage House finding ways to distribute food and continue to offer classes online. I watched how staff and volunteers alike used their skills and abilities to keep up with each new chapter of the pandemic as it unfolded.

What has become even more evident to me is how valuable an organization like Vintage House is to the quality of life in our community. Vintage House is more than its physical location. It is a legacy of caring and vision that Jerry Casson and her crew left us. It is a focal point for staying engaged with all aspects of aging including learning, health, and building and sustaining community. Maybe that's the most important lesson I have learned this past year. None of us can make it without some kind of support and connection with those we love and who love us.

The end to this pandemic is now in sight. What remains are the stories of resilience, courage, loss, and triumph. We are forever changed by what we have been through. What should we do with those stories? Perhaps we should share them.
